## About Women's History Month

Women's History Month is an annual declared month that highlights the contributions of women to events in history and contemporary society. It is celebrated during March in the United States, the United Kingdom, and Australia, corresponding with International Women's Day on March 8, and during October in Canada, corresponding with the celebration of Persons Day on October 18.

The commemoration began in 1978 as "Women's History Day in Sonoma County, California, and was championed by Gerda Lerner and the National Women's History Alliance to be recognized as a national week (1981) and then month (1987) in the United States, spreading internationally after that.

### Podcasts

What'sHerName

What'sHerName women's history podcast is hosted and produced by academic sisters Dr. Katie Nelson and Olivia Meikle. Committed to reclaiming forgotten history, What'sHerName tells the stories of fascinating women you've never heard of (but should have). Through compelling interviews with guest historians, writers, and scholars, Olivia and Katie bring to life the "lost" women of history. Fascinating and funny, thought-provoking and thoughtful, What'sHerName restores women's voices to the conversation.

Encyclopedia Womanica

Thinking back to our history classes growing up, we had one question: Where the ladies at? Enter, Womanica. In just 5 minutes a day, learn about different incredible women throughout history. On Wonder Media Network's awardwinning podcast, they tell the stories of women you may or may not know — but definitely should.

### • The History Chicks

This isn't History 101 and there is no test. The goal is to introduce you to female characters in history, factual or fictional via podcast and show notes. An introduction, an overview and a little push to explore and learn more on your own. The show notes will give you a short look at the life of the person being discussed - basic facts and links to other sources to learn more. The podcast episodes will go into greater detail as they chat about the challenges, failures and successes, times, and all the juicy bits that they find interesting about the life of women. opportunities Sometimes, as present themselves, we will add Special Features here on our website that relate to the person that we are spotlighting.

### Notorious Women

"A comedy podcast about history's most notorious women." The hosts will take you back in time to learn about people like Norma McCorvey (the Jane Roe in *Roe v. Wade)*, and sometimes even weave in current topics like coronavirus or commentary on the Oscar-winning film *Parasite*.

### Queens Podcast

If you want to learn about all the powerful women of history, Queens Podcast is the route you need to go down. The show focuses on "female rulers throughout history who handled their business and slayed." You'll learn about women like Nefertiti, Marie Laveau, and Empress Wu.

#### Wonder Women

Carrie Hope Fletcher and Celinde Schoenmaker believe there is a Wonder Woman in all of us. So grab a coffee and join them as they dive into topics such as female friendships, women that time forgot, love and sex and we hope we leave you feeling a little bit more wonderful than before.

HERstory

An exploration of wonderful women in history.

• The Profess-Hers Podcast

Topics include Movies, TV, History, Culture, Music, Books: What they say about women and what women say about them. Written and hosted by two college professors.

#### Deviant Women

The hosts of Deviant Women discuss a different 'deviant' woman from history, fiction, mythology and the contemporary world: those who aren't afraid to break the rules, to subvert the system, to explore, to seek and to challenge the status quo.

### The Door History

The goal of this podcast is to "even things out just a little bit" by highlighting important women's history stories in a world that focuses on men. The podcast travels back centuries in time to discuss the different women who set the cogs in motion for today's contemporary idea of feminism. You may not have heard of the podcast's subjects before, but you'll definitely recognize them and their achievements.

### Documentaries

Documentaries allow us to re-live historic moments and provide insight into our culture and society.

• Advocate (2020)

Lea Tsemel, a controversial figure in her native Israel, works as a human-rights attorney specializing in defending the underserved Palestinian community in Israel. The film focuses on the case of a teenage Palestinian boy on trial in Jerusalem and draws inspection on what it means to be an advocate.

• American Master: How it Feels to Be Free (2021)

Lena Horne, Abbey Lincoln, Nina Simone, Diahann Carroll, Cicely Tyson, Pam Grier – each a formattable trailblazer in her own right but their combined story illustrates what it takes to challenge an industry deeply steeped in gender and racial prejudice. This documentary focuses on their heartening journey through entertainment industry.

• Toni Morrison: The Pieces I Am (2019)

This documentary investigates the trials and tribulations of the unflappable and defiant Noble Prize winner Toni Morrison. Toni and guests delve into the roles of author, professor, editor, mother, and wife and illustrate the greatness of the composition in the face of racial and gender inequality.

 Margaret Atwood: A Word After A Word After A Word Is Power (2021)

In this documentary, Author Margaret Atwood and guests discuss her work and life, from the early days in the sleepy Canadian wilderness to become an ever-resonant popular icon, as she finishes the final chapters of the sequel to the Handmaid's Tale.

 Be Natural: The Untold Story of Alice Guy-Blaché (2018)

Lost to history, the tale of Alice Guy-Blaché is explored in this investigative documentary. Inspired by Lumières's Cinématographe, Alice, a young French immigrant, dedicates her life to film and film production and along the way becomes a pioneer in the nascent American film industry before being shut out.

• Saudi Women's Driving School (2019)

"Without freedom, you cannot feel like you are a human being.... You feel like a thing. You are not a person."

Until 2018, it was illegal for a woman to drive in Saudi Arabia. This documentary shows how a small allowance has affected Saudi culture, its patriarchal institutions, and draws into question on the roles gender should play in the greater society

• Jane Goodall: The Hope

Following in footsteps of the award-winning 2017 documentary Jane, this film examines Jane Goodall's activism and advocacy for animal rights and environment preservation around the world.

• Young Lakota (2013)

The film centers on lives of three young Lakota as their tribe, the Oglala Sioux, finds

itself in the middle of a political firestorm. Confronted by high rape statistics and poor healthcare access, Cecilia Fire Thunder, the leader and the first female President of the Oglala Sioux tribe, forges a path in defiance of a proposed South Dakota law criminalizing all abortions. The documentary explores the interplay between political, cultural, and economic conditions as the young Lakota choose paths that will define their lives and impact their tribe.

Where to Watch: Kanopy

• He Named Me Malala (2015)

At the age of 15, Malala Yousafzai was shot in the head by the Taliban for daring to challenge the strictures on female education. This documentary follows Malala as she emerges to become a global activist for women's education and a symbol for courage with the support of her father.

### Movies

Movies, unlike documentaries, allow for more creative interpretation and allow filmmakers to bring different elements to life through storytelling.

• Erin Brockovich (2000)

An unemployed single mother becomes a legal assistant and almost single-handedly brings down a California power company accused of polluting a city's water supply.

• League of Their Own (1992)

Two sisters join the first female professional baseball league and struggle to help it succeed amidst their own growing rivalry.

• Battle of Sexes (2017)

The true story of the 1973 tennis match between World number one Billie Jean King and ex-champ and serial hustler Bobby Riggs.

• North Country (2005)

A fictionalized account of the first major successful sexual harassment case in the United States, Jenson vs. Eveleth Mines, where a woman who endured a range of abuse while working as a miner filed and won the landmark 1984 lawsuit.

• The Post (2017)

A cover-up spanning four U.S. Presidents pushes the country's first female newspaper publisher and her editor to join an unprecedented battle between press and government

• Miracle Worker (1962)

The story of Anne Sullivan's struggle to teach the blind and deaf Helen Keller how to communicate.

• Elizabeth (1998)

The early years of the reign of Elizabeth I of England and her difficult task of learning what is necessary to be a monarch.

• Ma Rainey's Black Bottom (2020)

Tensions rise when trailblazing blues singer Ma Rainey and her band gather at a recording studio in Chicago in 1927.

• Radium Girls (2018)

In the 1920s a group of factory workers advocate for safer work conditions after some of their colleagues become ill from radium exposure.

• Evita (1996)

The hit musical based on the life of Eva Perón (Evita Duarte), a B-picture Argentinian actress who eventually became the wife of Argentinian president Juan Domingo Perón, and the most beloved and hated woman in Argentina.

## If you want to talk to connect and contextualize:

• The National Museum of Women in the Arts

The National Museum of Women in the Arts was incorporated in November 1981 as a private, nonprofit museum. During its first five years, NMWA operated from the Holladay residence, which hosted a temporary office and docent-led tours of the collection. In 1983, the museum purchased its building at 1250 New York Avenue, NW—a 78,810-square-foot Washington landmark near the White House that was constructed in 1908 as a Masonic Temple. It was refurbished in accordance with the highest design, museum, and security standards, and won numerous architectural awards.

In April 1987, NMWA opened the doors of our permanent location with the inaugural exhibition American Women Artists, 1830–1930, a survey curated by one of the country's foremost feminist art historians, Dr. Eleanor Tufts.

Beginning in 2021, the museum will begin its first full renovation since 1987, adding 3,000 square feet of gallery space, a new Learning Commons, and enhanced visitor accessibility.
